

Marisol



Since 1967, American deaf theatre artists have had a place in the professional theatre space thanks to The National Theatre for the Deaf. Since the inception of NTD, deaf theatre artists have continued to branch off and thrive across the United States

There are many Deaf theatres and initiatives in Texas including North Texas Performing Arts Deaf Theatre, Deaf Austin Theatre, and the Tony Award-winning Deaf West Theatre.

Here are some ways that you can celebrate Deaf Awareness Month in the classroom:

- 2. Highlight deaf theatre artists
- 3. Explore deaf theatre history
- 4. Donate to deaf theatres and theatre training programs.

by Stephen Sachs




Vignettes of the Deaf Character and Other Plays



Technical Theatre Tip of the Month

As you begin the school year, it's also time to focus on building your technical theatre portfolio.

What is a portfolio? It is a means of presenting your work in a visual way. Simply put, it means taking pictures of EVERYTHING. The most important part of your portfolio is not the finished product, it's the process. The more of your process you can show the better off you are gonna be.

Pro Tip: You can take photos with your phone but remember to keep your photos, samples, and paperwork organized in folders throughout the entire process of the production.

The best way to showcase your work is through a website. There are many free options that allow you to create your own such as Google Sites, Weebly, and Wix. Explore your options!

If you want to include multiple art forms, be sure to section your website into those categories so that prospective employers or colleges can see what they want.

Organize your productions in order from most recent to oldest. You want your most recent work front and center.

Credits to include for every production/project:

- Name of the production
- Venue/location of production
- Dates of production
- Director
- Designers (if known)
- Your position/title in the production (if not listed as a designer)

Portfolio Building



Photos for every production:

- Wide-angle pictures that showcase the whole project
- · Detail work on pieces
- Progress photos of pieces being worked on
- Clear, professional-looking production photos (final dress/preview is a great time for this)

Pro Tip: Get in the habit of documenting your productions on a spreadsheet with the credited information. You will need this information later for developing your resumes and having it in one spot will save you lots of time.

Show yourself as an artist. That may be through drafting, renderings, and resumes — but it might also be through photography, painting, drawing, sketching, doodling, and simple communication of your passion for the art form.

Include a description of your photos.

- · Showcase the work you did
- Details on the process of making it
- Describe what is being shown

Let your parents brag... it's good for advocacy!

I know... sometimes parents can be embarrassing and social media in the hands of a proud mom is a teenager's worst nightmare. However, when it comes to advocating for the future of fine arts education, we all need to "brag" more and look for opportunities to spread these stories to decision-makers and the next generation of arts parents.

As theater arts students, you know how important these classes are to building the necessary soft skills not taught in other classes. Unfortunately, not all decision-makers know about these benefits, and they are faced with more and more difficult budget cuts every year. Plus, not all elementary parents know to ask and fight for these classes unless they experienced it themselves.

We as arts advocates have been traditionally bad about "preaching to the choir only after you joined the choir" and that's too late. We all need to look for opportunities to share our experiences and tell our stories to everyone, especially those outside of our fine arts bubbles and parents of children before they are faced with those overwhelming 5th-grade choice sheets.

How can you build your advocacy toolkit within your family?

- 1. First, share your achievements and experiences with your parents. Talk with them about what you love about theater and why. Let them share this with others.
- 2. Educate yourself and your parents on the benefits of fine arts education and how it contributes to cognitive, emotional, and social development. Learn about your district's policies regarding funding classes and extracurricular programs.
- 3. Encourage your parents to engage in local and statewide advocacy by following and subscribing to Parents for Arts Education at www.parentsforartseducation.org





How can you help with advocacy in your school?

- 1. Share your achievements and experiences with your friends and classmates.
- 2. Invite your teachers and administrators to performances and share with them your love of theater. Support and coordinate with other fine arts students on your campus.
- 3. Support their performances and other events as well. For example, if you show your support for athletics then hopefully, they also will want to support you.
- 4. Encourage your parents not only to join the theater booster club but the school PTA too. There they can build relationships with other parents, teachers, and administrators and share their experiences as a fine arts parent.

How can you help with advocacy in your community?

- 1. Encourage your parents to share your experience with all who will listen. Parent-to-parent communication is so helpful as we all navigate the school system. One example is the Texas PTA's "Arts in Education" meeting through their Connect program. Parents for Arts Education is encouraging current HS fine arts booster parents to reach out to elementary PTAs to come talk at this meeting. Contact Parents for Arts Education for more information.
- 2. Look for opportunities to volunteer in your feeder elementary schools. You all need service hours and many elementary music and art teachers would welcome help.
- 3. Invite school board members, community leaders, and representatives to your performances. Look for opportunities to recognize your program's successes at their meetings.

Remember that advocating for fine arts education is long-term and takes persistence. Continue to share your love and passion for theater always. Additionally, encouraging your parents to share what participating in theater did for you is a vital component to ensuring fine arts education remains a vital component to future student's educational experience.

TRICK OR TREAT SO KIDS CAN EAT

What is TOTS Eat?

Trick or Treat so Kids Can Eat, or TOTS Eat, is the annual initiative from the International Thespian Society to collect food from those in need. Every year, over 300 troupes participate in this community service, in doing so they have racked up more than 4 million pounds in donations since 2003! These donations usually come in near Halloween and are given to local charities.

What is the history of TOTS Eat?

Linda Webb, a Kansas chapter director, launched a food drive in 2003 that became the national program TOTS Eat. Kansas Thespian troupes collected food on Halloween for local charities. Because the program was so successful, it caught the attention of the EdTA and became nationally incarnated in 2004. Ms. Webb was inducted into the Kansas Hall of Fame for this and other achievements in 2005.

How can your troupe participate in TOTS Eat?

One way to participate is by splitting students into teams of 4; those teams would then collect as many canned food items as possible, and whichever team gets the highest amount of canned food items wins!

Here are some ways to collect donations:

- Specify a time on your campus to take donations from other students or staff.
- Go around neighborhoods and post flyers to alert others to your food drive; detail where to drop off donations.
- Utilize your troupe's social media to spread the word!
- Dress up in your Halloween costumes, and instead of asking for candy, ask for some canned food for your local charities instead!





Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA) is excited to share resources and opportunities for you, your staff, and your students. TCA is a state agency that supports a diverse and innovative arts community in Texas by providing resources to enhance arts education, economic development, cultural tourism, and artist sustainability initiatives.

TCA's programs for schools and students include:

<u>Poetry Out Loud</u>: Poetry Out Loud is a national program that encourages high school students to explore and recite poetry through a competitive platform.

<u>Texas Young Masters</u>: TCA and the Texas Cultural Trust provide \$5,000 educational grants for two years for 8th -11th grade students to support arts training for the rising stars of Texas.

Performance Support: This non-competitive TCA grant program provides a portion of the professional artist fees to Texas nonprofits, schools, colleges, and units of government for hiring an artist from the Texas Touring Roster to do a performance, lead a workshop/clinic, etc. with quarterly deadlines.
