UIL OAP Doesn't Define Your Potential and Ability

In an environment such as theatre for many UIL participating schools, this next season is the most stressful of the year. If you have no idea what I'm talking about, it's One Act Play season.

High School One Act Play is a UIL (University Interscholastic League) event during the second semester of the school year. This event is a competition where schools of similar sizes compete against each other. During this contest, schools each put on an 18 - 40 minute show. They have 7 minutes to set and strike the stage. A panel of one or three judges then adjudicates these shows.

The levels of competition are Zone/District, Bi-District, Area, Region, and State. Each level allows the show to advance to the next level. Only three schools are chosen to advance until the Regional meet, where only two schools are chosen. Those two schools then advance to the State meet, the highest level to get to in UIL. At this meet, instead of advancing, the top three schools at the state get recognized as Champion, First Runner-up, and Second Runner-up. My school, Midland High School, Troupe 3376, was awarded State Champion for the 6A State Meet in 2023 for our production of *The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane*.

When you get to a level such as a state, you must keep your mental and bodily health in mind. The One Act season can be an exceptionally mentally taxing experience, and many get burnt out during this time. Just remember to keep your schoolwork as a priority at all times. You are a STUDENT, Thespian. The student part comes first before anything else. If you are feeling down about your role in your own school's One Act or are bummed that your school didn't advance, then remember: There are still plenty of opportunities for yourself to shine in your Troupe and make your Troupe shine. These opportunities include a Junior Varsity show or a Student-Directed play.

Whenever my school does not make it far in the One Act season, we put on a Student-Directed play. These plays allow students who may have yet to make it into the initial one-act cast another chance to shine in these plays. They also let students who want to test the waters in a directing field and help enhance their college resume.

A Junior Varsity One Act Play show is another way to allow students to learn and grow outside of the Varsity One Act Cast. This show has requirements similar to the UIL OAP competition, except instead of advancing, it allows for a learning experience for aspiring actors who may need more time to be ready for the Varsity Cast.

Even though I only recounted a couple of opportunities, there are still countless more ways to prove yourself within your troupe. Just because an adjudicator didn't advance your show, does not mean your show was bad or that your acting ability wasn't good enough. Pretty much every One Act Play show is a high-quality show, it's just a hard competition with very limited wiggle room for mistakes that, sometimes, are not anyone's fault. If you can't remember anything from this blog, remember this: your OAP results are not the end of the world - it's the start of a new one with even more education.

Theatre Scholar Distinction Awards

Texas Thespians is pleased to recognize theatre students who demonstrate high academic success in overall coursework through the Texas Theatre Scholar Distinction Award program.

To be designated a Texas Theatre Scholar, a student must meet the following criteria:

- Currently enrolled in the school and is a member in good standing with the campus theatre department or similar program.
- Has actively participated in theatrical activities/programs during that school year.
- Has earned a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale or its local equivalent for all academic coursework, as determined upon completion of tenth grade or any official grading period thereafter. Students with a 3.5 cumulative GPA become Vice President's List Scholars, and students with a 4.0 GPA are awarded the President's List Scholar distinction.
- Has fulfilled any additional local criteria required by the theatre program or similar campus requirements.
- Exhibits behavior and good moral character, which brings honor to the program, school, and community.
- The Texas Theatre Scholar form is available from December 1, 2023, to February 1, 2024.

To honor our Texas Theatre Scholars, the student shall:

- 1. Complete the Scholars Forms and upload the required documentation.
- 2. Please use the checklist provided on the website to help ensure all required documents are submitted. (See Checklist Icon)
- 3. This is a free event! No funds are needed to participate.



Details

Nominations must be submitted by the student from **December 1 - February 1.**Before the deadline of February 1, students must not only enter their desire to be recognized as a Texas Theatre Scholar but also submit a verification of GPA form (LINK) signed by the school counselor or principal. A committee will review applicants' submissions before awarding Scholar status. **Recipients will be notified by email after**

February 1, 2024, and awarded the distinction of Texas Theatre Scholar.

How have your theatre education experiences helped prepare you to actively participate in our democracy?

Our democracy requires tact and patience in order to develop and survive as a worthwhile member of society. This, I have found, is quite similar to how a theatre company operates. Seeing as I have six years of involvement in theatre productions and companies, the experiences I have gathered throughout my time in them have proven worthwhile in my preparation for entering the world as an independent and stable citizen. Utilizing tact and rationalization, electing those with level heads and resolve, and possessing the courage to expand on the skills I have learned all contribute to the member of society that I am and one day hope to be.





Theatre is not an entity to be taken lightly. The stress, frustrations, and irritations that come with performing and participating in a constantly evolving and expanding art form can be harsh if you are not accustomed to it. Even though the environment can be tough, it is also incredibly challenging and provides a catalyst from which you can excel in ways unknown to even yourself. That being said, however, those challenges come with significant consequences. I have been focused on technical theatre throughout my involvement with the art, and I have learned throughout that time that caution and restraint are the only ways to approach serious and oftentimes potentially dangerous situations; for example: there have been many times when the people in my company made rash or unwise decisions. myself included. ultimately led to the downfall of a project or a negative outcome within the production. These setbacks and failures only serve to better your understanding of the processes needed to approach situations responsibly and intelligently, and to do so safely and with the

adequate caution required.

Lily Meyer is a Senior at Lamar Consolidated High School and a member of Mustang Playhouse Theatre Company, Troupe 2806. I am a perfectionist. As such, things such as compromise, restraint, and a lack of control can be incredibly difficult for me. Theatre forces you into an environment catered to those who excel where I tend to fail. Due to this, the advocacy for unheard voices within a theatre company is extremely important to me. Understanding how to elect officers who will advocate for your concerns and have the resolve to maintain the promises they presented whilst campaigning is one of the most useful skills you can gain while being part of a theatre company. You learn whom you can rely on, observe their resolve and follow through, and have a hands-on example of noticing a change in a person when confronted with the responsibilities handed to them. This translates incredibly well to the workplace and wider society as you can see how people fit for the positions they want strive to get there and tackle the requirements needed to earn their place. These ideals have also allowed me to grow, bettering my interactive and social skills, and establishing a basis for compromise and collaboration.

Participating in a theatre company requires cooperation just as much as anything in life does, and when it comes to working with others to execute specific vision, the ability communicate what is needed and how to ultimately achieve that goal on a smaller scale provides so much support towards proper communication skills and interpersonal interactions later in life. Theatre companies place you amidst peers who are just as hardworking, intelligent, passionate, and inventive as yourself, and learning how to combine those talents and abilities into a cohesive product as a team is wonderful exercise in human collaboration and ingenuity.

I have had the honor of working with some of the most astounding people I have ever known, and I believe that their support and hard work have changed the way I exist in the world and around others to the benefit of everything I do.

Theatre is not an easy environment to exist in, and neither is society. But, given the grace of outstanding people, a willing work ethic, and an open-minded perspective, growth, maturity, and understanding blossom in the face of adversity and turmoil. My experiences in theatre have contributed more to my understanding of the world than quite a lot else, and I feel prepared to tackle the responsibilities of society as backed by what I have learned through theatre.

TECH TIPS

Coating Foam:

While there are commercial coats out there, a cheap and easy method is cheesecloth and PVA glue. Pour glue into a small container. Add water to make it more brushable and tint it using a few drops of paint. Brush glue on to foam lay a piece of cheesecloth over it, and brush more glue on it. Let dry.

Why cheesecloth?

Cheesecloth holds the foam together should it encounter a sharp object. Keeping the piece attached gives you a better handle on repairs. The vinyl in the glue helps prevent dents and hardens just making it more durable for transport. Latex paint is thick enough to cover most of the texture and is not noticeable from a distance.

Tips for Success

- Capitals, regardless of the material it's made from, should have ½" gap around the pylon. ½" gives you enough room for wraps and sliding architectural trim under the capital.
- Take multiple pictures with a measuring tape in the frame of your capital. Put these
 measurements in your contest book just in case a contest manager wants to measure your
 pieces. It can save time in an already stressful environment.
- Clear Gorilla Glue is best for gluing foam pieces together. ALWAYS use water on the material surface to activate the glue. Keep a spray bottle on hand NEVER add water to the glue bottle itself
- Pink foam is only available in 2" thickness at Home Depot. Blue foam up to 1" is available at any big box store.
- Search for flexible molding and urethane millwork if you are interested in dressing up your capitals with fancy trim.


